**Aboriginal peoples** First Nations, Inuit, and Métis peoples

**agriculture** the growing of crops and raising of animals

**Alberta clipper** a fierce, cold wind that starts near the Rocky Mountains and quickly blows out of the province

**archeologists** people who study buildings and objects from the past

**artifacts** include items that were made or used by people long ago. Some Aboriginal artifacts are known as historical cultural items.

bison buffalo

**bitumen** a thick, sticky tar made of oil

**British Isles** the countries of England, Scotland, Wales, and Ireland together

**British** the people who come from the British Isles

**buffalo** Canada's largest land mammal

**Canadiens** Francophones who were born in Canada

**chinook** a warm, dry wind that blows down from the Rocky Mountains **climate** weather that is common in an area over a long period of time

**conservation** the careful use of natural resources, so that they will not run out

**conserve** to use something carefully so it will last longer

**cultural heritage** the beliefs, customs, knowledge, values, and history shared by a group of people

diverse population a population that is made up of people from many different cultures and backgrounds

**drought** a long period with far less rain or snow than usual

**Elders** people respected for their wisdom and understanding of traditional knowledge

**electricity** a form of energy that can produce heat, light, and movement

**energy** power, or the ability to do work

**environment** all the aspects of nature that surround us

fact something that is true

**First Nations** groups who were the first to live in North America

**fort** a building or set of buildings surrounded by a strong wall

**fossil fuels** fuels like oil, gas, and coal that come from the remains of ancient plants and animals

**fossils** the remains or shapes of ancient plants and animals that have turned into stone

**Francophones** people whose first and main language is French

**Francophonie**, **la** an organization of French-speaking countries around the world

**fur trade** the exchange of goods for fur between European traders and First Nations people, lasting from about the 1750s to the 1830s

**geologists** scientists who study land and rocks, and how they are formed

**glaciers** very thick sheets of ice and snow that move slowly across the land

**governor general** the representative of the British king or queen in Canada

**habitat** the place where an animal makes its home in nature

**heritage rangelands** protected areas that preserve the prairie grasslands

historical cultural items a respectful term used to define artifacts that are still used by Aboriginal people today

**homestead** the quarter section of land that the government granted to settlers who were willing to live on the land and farm it

**homesteaders** the people who lived on the homestead

**iinisskimm** special stones with great spiritual importance

**immigrants** people who move to a different country to live

**immigrate** to move to a different country to live

inquiry an investigation into a
topic, especially by asking questions

**irrigation** supplying the land with water, using dams, ditches, and sprinklers

**landforms** the different features of the land, such as mountains, hills, or plains

**landscape** the natural scenery of a very large area

**legislative assembly** leaders who represent the people and make decisions about running a territory or province

**logging** cutting down trees and taking logs to the mills

**lumber** wood that has been cut into boards

**Métis** people descended from British or Canadiens traders and First Nations

**missionary** someone who travels to teach his or her religion to a group of people

**national parks** parks managed by the government of Canada to preserve the natural beauty or places of historical importance

**natural heritage** natural areas, animals, plants, landforms, and landscapes that are important to a country or region because of their beauty or history

**natural region** an area with its own natural vegetation, climate, and landforms

**natural resources** things found in nature that are useful to us, including air, water, soil, oil and gas, minerals, forests, and animals

**natural vegetation** the plants that grow naturally in an area

**non-renewable resources**resources that cannot be replaced or renewed

**nun** a member of a religious community of women who spends her life in prayer and service to others

**oil sands** a mixture of sand, clay, rock, and bitumen

**opinion** what someone thinks or believes

**oral teaching** a way of remembering the past through stories and spoken explanation, rather than in writing

**paleontologists** scientists who study fossils to learn about very old forms of life

**parks** areas of land where people can enjoy protected landscapes, plants, and wildlife

**pemmican** buffalo meat that has been dried, pounded, and mixed with hot buffalo grease and dried berries

**perspective** the point of view of a group of people; a way of seeing and understanding the world

**population** the number of people who live in an area

**portage** to carry a canoe and supplies over the land

**protected areas** areas of land governments have set aside to protect special features such as plants, animals, and landforms **provincial parks** parks managed by provincial governments to preserve places of natural or historical importance

**quality of life** a person's or a community's sense of safety, comfort, security, health, and happiness

**renewable resources** resources that can be replaced, if they are used carefully

**roots** deep connections to a place where we belong

**scrip** a coupon that can be exchanged for land or money

**seam of coal** a long layer of coal below the Earth's surface

**sustainable resource** a resource that is used only as much as it can be replaced, so that it lasts for the future

**technology** any of the tools or ways of doing things that people use to get tasks done or to make their lives easier

**tourism** travelling and touring to see and enjoy places away from home

**travois** a frame, pulled by a horse or a dog, used for moving a teepee and for carrying belongings

**treaty** an agreement between two nations

urban areas towns and cities

**voyageur** a person who travelled by canoe, working for fur-trading companies

**weather** conditions such as temperature, rain, and sunshine on a single day

wetlands areas covered by water, including ponds, sloughs, and marshy areas, that provide a habitat for wildlife

wilderness areas large protected areas with strict limits on how the land is used; vehicles and many recreational activities are not allowed

wildland provincial parks large protected areas in a province where little development takes place; some activities like hiking and camping are allowed

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
